NO ONE AT HOME SPEAKS FRENCH, IS THIS PROGRAM FOR US?

Saskatoon Public Schools' French immersion program is designed for students whose first language is not French. Parents do not need to speak French in order to enroll their children in French Immersion — most parents have limited or no French language skills.



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ARE THERE ANY BENEFITS TO KNOWING A SECOND LANGUAGE?

There are many research-supported advantages to learning another language. Here are just a few:

- Positive impact on thinking skills, like problem-solving and multitasking
- Stronger spelling and reading comprehension
- Increased understanding of and respect for other people, languages, and cultures

WHEN CAN MY CHILD START FRENCH IMMERSION?

Students generally enter the program in **kindergarten or Grade 1**. At Saskatoon Public Schools we have an early immersion program that establishes the foundations of the French language in the first few grades of school. Early enrolment in this program provides the best opportunity for student success.



WHEN WILL MY CHILD START ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS? WILL ENGLISH LANGUAGE SKILLS SUFFER IN FRENCH IMMERSION?

Your child will receive formal English language arts instruction in Grade 3.


Students' English language skills will not suffer in French immersion. Your child will be taught reading skills in French. These skills will transfer from reading in French to reading in English. Many children will be reading in English before Grade 3. While children may experience a brief lag in English reading and writing, French immersion students normally "catch up" to their peers in the English program by the end of Grade 5. Learning a second language, in fact, supports first language learning.



OUR FIRST LANGUAGE IS NOT ENGLISH. CAN I REGISTER MY CHILD IN FRENCH IMMERSION?

Children have the ability to learn multiple languages at the same time. When formal English language arts instruction begins in Grade 3, English as an Additional Language (EAL) support may be available, if deemed necessary at that time.
